RAISING REPORTS

SELMA complements the existing paper SOR form, which will continue to be used but will now be called a Workplace Observation form.



SETTING STANDARDS

The Project has recently been subject to an ISO14001:2015 audit.

Examined over the course of three days, the environmental management audit covered aspects of the Site including the batching plants, Nuclear Island, and water management zone 3.

The water consolidation area and fuel farms were also inspected, and the Project's general materials management was examined on the final day.

BOUYGUES BEGINS BUILDINGS

The two-year build of our first permanent buildings has officially begun, with the arrival of Bouygues UK to Site.

The team, which is taking possession of its areas of work from Kier BAM in phased handovers, will construct the Simulator Training Centre and the Framatome Warehouse.

Foundations for both of the buildings are about to be laid and erection of the steel frame for the buildings is expected to take place in early 2019. Iain Brooks, Construction Area Delivery Manager, Ancillary Buildings, said: "The Site contains a lot of Blue Anchor rock, which has meant more remedial work was needed than first anticipated, but we're delighted to have started work at HPC."

COLOSSAL CRANE

One of the world's biggest cranes will soon be heading to HPC.

From Spring 2019, the Sarens Giant Crane (SGC) 250 will become a huge landmark on the Site skyline, lifting heavy precast concrete sections, and mechanical and electrical equipment into the main buildings and reactors.

Developed by Sarens specifically for the Project, the monster crane will be transported from its home in Belgium, to a nearby lay yard and then moved in parts to Site, where it will be assembled over a 12-week period.

SPOTLIGHT ON SEXUAL HEALTH

Look out for the new clinic that will be on Site next month, which will provide team members with sexual health information, advice and testing.

The clinic, which will be located in Hinkley Health, will be run by Somerset Wide Integrated Sexual Health (SWISH). SWISH is a local authority-run service to promote good sexual health and give access to contraceptive and sexual health services.

Starting on 04 December, between 12:30 and 16:30, the SWISH team will be offering a free, confidential service to team members, to provide advice and to test and treat chlamydia, HIV and gonorrhoea.

Angela Young, Health and Wellbeing Manager, said: "We're approaching this issue proactively by having SWISH on Site four times a year. We're hoping their specialist support will help prevent sexually transmitted diseases."

"Many infections are painless, and undiagnosed or untreated infections can cause infertility in both men and women. Our message is 'do not risk it'. Have a test confidentially at Hinkley Health."

BRUSHING UP ON GUM HEALTH

This month, we're also focusing on the importance of dental care. Did you know that the state of your teeth affects your overall health, with gum disease linked to health problems in other parts of the body?
